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As soon as you get this book call in all the neighbors with their musical instruments and have the time of your life. Every one will be ten years younger after the first song. Twenty years, if they use a ukulele.

The Ukulele and the Banjo uke are so well known that it is hardly necessary to explain the diagram chords. However as this book will travel into remote parts of Africa, Chinook Estates, Arctic Circle, Mars (*via radio*) and other wild places an explanation of chords will help new converts. Wherever you go take the Uke with you, It may save your life. It is a wonder.

DIAGRAM CHORDS

The horizontal lines are the frets across the fingerboard of the ukulele. The vertical lines are the strings. The black dots show where to place the left hand fingers. The figures near the dot indicates the finger of the left hand. The letters underneath tell the name of the chord for other instruments as well as the ukulele.

The D tuning is used for the ukulele. Those using the C tuning can read from the names of the chords or play the diagram two frets higher.


O means opens strings or no strings held down.



STROKES

Strokes should be used a la inspiration. There are two strokes the down stroke (striking across the strings from you) and the up stroke (striking towards the performer). These strokes are made with first finger of right hand. Use Eureka felt pick, or as a roll stroke by using one finger after another across the strings and various other fashions to suit the player. Other strokes are explained in Littig's Practical Ukulele Method, Moyers Solos for Ukulele and Le Barges Ukulele Method.


