





Notes by William Heney:

Words & music by Randy Sparks (founder of the New Christy Minstrels), 1964. It appeared in the soundtrack of "Advance To The Rear", with Glenn Ford and Stella Stevens.

John Denver plays in F. You can use the version in the key of C if you use a Capo at the 5th fret.

The chords shown differ slightly with published versions. The harmony of the song seems to work much better with I, VI, II/II7, V/V7 with the introduction of a IV-IV3b transition from Major to minor in the last line of the chorus. The II and V chords with 7th indicated should be used where best suited for effect but not always otherwise the sequence becomes boring. The "F" in the last line of the verse works. Spacing on the IV(II7) notation is not a musical indication, it is just to avoid crowding. The opening syllable of the chorus ("To") is a pickup. Slow melodic song.
